- Child abuse increased. Child hunger skyrocketed.
- The tragedy of sex trafficking went unreported for many victims.
- Nothing was normal about 2020, but one thing was evident: It takes an entire community to bring the love of Christ to a hurting child.
- Thank you for being our community.

Just before Christmas, Gavin*, at two years old, was abandoned by his father in the middle of the night. When Gavin was placed in the care of One More Child foster parents, hope poured into Gavin's life – hope that could only be brought through Christ.

In 2020, we impacted 324,409 lives – each one special like Gavin.

Since the founding of our organization in 1904, we have pressed on for one more child. Our teams are working around the clock to provide direct-care services for foster children, trafficked children, hungry children, single moms and struggling families amidst elevated needs. Last year alone, we provided 19,199,456 meals – meeting urgent, tangible needs while leading families to break cycles of poverty.

As we press on in 2021, I think of one child especially. When Desireé Montgomery was seven, her mom passed away. She and her two younger siblings were now in a home where they were neglected. Years later, Desireé was the primary advocate for her two sisters – she fought for them at all costs. At the age of 14, she was interviewing *us* to make sure our organization would be ideal for her and her sisters. We passed Desireé's test. Desireé and her sisters came to live on one of our campuses through foster care. They became part of our family forever.



Desireé grew up, graduating at the top of her class, excelling in college as well as in her career. Earlier this year, it was our turn to interview Desireé – for a job. It was a full-circle moment when Desireé applied to become part of our work team. She passed the test with flying colors. Desireé now works full-time as a director on our staff advocating for other children just like she did for her own sisters all those years ago.

Thank you for your support that allows us to impact one more child – **Now. Then. Always.**

After 700 days in foster care, a judge declared via Zoom that **Isla Moody was officially part of her forever family**. It was a jubilant moment for the family of seven in April 2020, a season of life where the unexpected was becoming normal in the midst of a pandemic.

One More Child foster parents Evan and Cayela Moody do not live near family, part of the sacrifice they make as a military family, but their church and the local foster care community in Jacksonville, Florida, have faithfully supported them through the highs and lows of their foster care adventure.

That truth was on full display as their friends orchestrated a socially distanced homecoming parade with a slow line of cars honking horns and waving streamers in approval of the milestone day.

"Whether or not she had understanding at all, or to what degree she understood what was going on, we'll be able to look back at that day and say, 'You were really loved by a lot of people,'" Evan Moody said. "And yeah, you were adopted during a pandemic and that was super weird, but that being said, you didn't just have a party, you had a parade."

The Moodys welcomed Isla, who they describe as "articulate with a beautiful and easygoing personality,"

into their home as their first foster care placement when she was only 7 days old.

"Biologically we are not related to Isla at all, yet there was an immediate connection there," Evan said.

The Moodys readily admit that being foster parents involves a steep, and sometimes emotional, learning curve for a family, but it's one that is well worth it.

Children are being removed from their homes every day due to abuse, abandonment and neglect. At One More Child, we believe the best place for every foster child is in a loving, Christian home, and that's why we license foster parents, help churches create wraparound care programs to support foster families, and why many of our own staff members are foster and adoptive parents.

The Moodys continue to serve as incredible examples of what it looks like to step out in faith to help a child in need

Jeff Scott (Jerry's grandson).



Today, in a world that moves faster than ever before, it is worthwhile to reflect on the impact made on five generations (the great-great grandchildren of the Scott siblings are part of the family today) because of the faithful obedience of people doing everything in their power to simply help "one more child."

"There are a lot of 'Scott families' out there who need the same encouragement, the same love, the same nourishing," Brad Scott said. "There is 'one more out there' who needs what this organization provides."

Today's Testimonies

Lives are changed every day at One More Child. Here are just a few examples of powerful and eternal change that took place in 2020.

Starved for Hope

Pictured below is a man who lives in a leper colony in Southeast Asia. When this photo was taken, he had not eaten in four days due to lack of resources. He was left alone in his tent to die.

We fed him, ministered to him, and ensured him that God loves him!

"It is only because of support from One More Child that we can feed children and people in the leper colony," said a ministry partner in the region.



Moving On

When Jennifer and her two precious children, Milo and Arianna, joined our Single Moms program, they were just trying to survive.

Jennifer was dealing with the fallout from a tough divorce and was forced to work two jobs with long, unfavorable hours, meaning she dropped her kids off at sunrise and couldn't pick them up until after dinner.

Through One More Child, Jennifer gained stable employment, learned life skills to help her thrive and was encouraged by a mentor.

Not only has Jennifer moved into a new home and established a healthy savings account, but she is chasing her dream of becoming a police officer.



"A year ago, I would have never thought I'd be here right now!" she beamed.

Finally Breaking Free

Lindsey* was lured into the sex trade as an impressionable teenager who thought she had found love in a boyfriend she "met" online. Instead, that man ended up being the one who coerced her into selling herself for sex — a life she escaped many times, only to become a victim again at the hands of a predator.

After law enforcement and a child protective investigator rescued Lindsey from trafficking at 17 years old, she desperately needed to be placed somewhere safe.

There is no one-size-fits-all approach to helping children and teens who have been manipulated and abused. For Lindsey, we provided individual and group counseling, medication management, and we paired her with a regional advocate who helped her navigate the resources in her community.

Our expert staff delivers immediate aid to victims, but also helps them develop crucial life skills and awareness that can propel them to safer, healthier lives. We built trust with Lindsey, and with that trust we were able to guide her toward



options far removed from the lifestyle in which she had become trapped.

Today, Lindsey is enrolled in college and is working on applying for scholarships and opening a bank account. Most importantly, she finally has the mentors and extended support system she desperately needed to be able to steer clear of devastating influences who viewed her as property instead of a person.

Hope Through the Struggle

As Bethany (pictured below), a single mom of four, looked into a box of food provided by One More Child, her grin matched her words. "This will go a long way. I can get one cup of this (rice) at a time and it will last like 2 months or 3 months. I can make a bunch of different meals with that," she said.

When Bethany enrolled in our Family Support program, she said she didn't have "anything," referring to food. However, because of One More Child her children had food on the table.

Losing her job because of the pandemic was difficult, especially with four children ages 8 and younger, but the Life Skills classes, food, diapers and support we provided helped the family weather the storm – something that was common in an unprecedented year.



When Robert, 16, got in trouble with the law, his mom knew he needed people who would hold him accountable and show him how to become a more respectable young man.

Through our Hope for Young Men program at One More Child Hope Street, Robert learned tools to better deal with the temptations and challenges that he has encountered growing up in Sulphur Springs, a neighborhood in inner-city Tampa where juvenile arrest rates are high and households rarely have a father figure present.

"Our curriculum is called GROWN Man, and it strives to counteract the macho-man image that is so prevalent in our culture at times," said Tara Smith, Hope for Youth program coordinator. "It calls for teens to respect authority, own their actions, learn how to develop their character and ultimately be navigated by purpose."

Robert barely spoke a word at the beginning of the 7-week course, but by the time he completed it, he could regularly be seen smiling as he talked with staff. Robert's mom, Marlene, who has lived in Sulphur Springs for nearly two decades, said her son is naturally intelligent, but it was important for him to hear from others that "there is more to life





than getting into trouble," and there are people who genuinely care about you.

"Sometimes you can live in a tough neighborhood and come out a genius. It's all about you staying focused and leaving trouble where trouble is at," she said.

After he completed the Hope for Young Men program, Robert gave

back by volunteering dozens of hours of community service that included building bikes, putting together furniture and constructing shelves to help others in the community.

As a friendship between One More Child staff and Marlene developed, we saw the wholehearted devotion she gives her son, as well as other children and families in the neighborhood. Her love for Jesus and others in the midst of hardships – which included losing her job due to COVID-19 and her house being broken into – is an example of what motivates us all the more to see our vision for a new campus in Tampa come to fruition.

We are in the process of raising \$17 million dollars to build a 25,000-square-foot warehouse, a recreational and youth facility, and eight paired villas (16 residences) for our single mothers and children.

This will be constructed on beautiful acreage in Sulphur Springs, and it will be a major expansion of One More Child Hope Street. We are excited to be part of helping vulnerable children and struggling families in Tampa thrive, like never before.

"Our whole mission is to provide hope for families and to point them to the hope of a relationship with Jesus Christ," Tara said. "We are planting seeds. When children or teens go back home and talk to their parents about the program, we start to build relationships and are able to help the community better."

Marlene said she hopes for a day where "hard working people who want and need help" in Sulphur Springs will get it, and in turn, will bless others.

"I can't say enough about One More Child," she said. "You can get ahold of people, even with COVID-19 going on, and you know they are there for you with a good conversation or helping Robert get something to eat; it's the small things that make One More Child a major impact."

That's So 2020

We don't always know what challenges or opportunities will come our way, but we do know that God is always at work, helping us help more children. Some of the ways we made an impact that were "so 2020" include...

Entering the Drive-Thru Business

We truly learned the art of distributing thousands of meals to hungry families with the help of amazing partners this year. We relied on churches – some who have been partnering with us for decades and others who said "yes" to feeding their communities – as well as some incredible government and business partners. We were honored to host Secretary

of Agriculture Sonny Perdue for a food distribution at our Joe K. Blanton International Headquarters, and partnered with Farm Share, GA Foods, Publix, Walmart and others to provide vital food to people during a pandemic.

Swipe, Click, Do Good, Share Hope

The One More Child TikTok community was a powerful force

for good, generating nearly half a million views, and raising more than \$10,000 to feed hungry children through TikTok.

We launched a fan favorite show on Facebook LIVE called Hope is Here, led by Christi Haag. She interviewed familiar faces like Donna Gaines, Jay Strack and Sheila Walsh on heart-warming devotionals that inspired people to have an impact for children and families through One More Child.



Zooming for Foster Children

To meet the increased needs of children and families during the pandemic, it meant pivoting in nearly every way. When in-person foster parent trainings were not possible, we quickly shifted to host potential foster families in 50 counties through Zoom. The result was more new foster families to wrap around children who were removed from their homes due to no fault of their own. Many families said "yes" to not only becoming first time parents (and foster parents) during the pandemic, but also "yes" to facilitating "Zoom school" at home.

Touch-Free Deliveries

At One More Child, the pandemic meant getting the children and families we serve the same necessary resources in creative new ways. We partnered with churches to leave boxes of food on the front steps of the homes of foster parents, our Anti-Trafficking team shipped everything from hygiene items to birthday kits to the victims we work with, and globally, we connected with new partners who provided resources on the ground.



Urgent COVID Relief

We provided urgent and immediate COVID relief to more than 500 families by way of rent and mortgage assistance, food, diapers and emergency necessities. More than \$1,000,000 of assistance was provided to these specific families who were facing crises because of job loss and more. Even greater, these families heard about the hope of Christ in dire circumstances and were wrapped around with ongoing support as they worked toward becoming self sufficient for their families.

Social Distanced Friendly Events

"Six feet apart." This year, our Single Moms staff enjoyed setting up socially distanced brunches for families on Mother's Day as well as a special public health-conscious shopping experience on one of our campuses. We offered "party box" pickups to help foster families through this extremely extended period of time being together 24/7. We also found new ways to do annual events like Christmas shopping for our Family Support clients.

Here We Grow

We have the expertise, staff and resources to continue to help more vulnerable children and struggling families across the globe. Because of your generous support we continue to say "Yes" to new opportunities.

These projects are just a few ways we are growing to meet dire need within local communities.





We Envision Tampa Like Never Before

The community there is teeming with potential and has shown great resilience, but the area is lacking the investment to help children in dire circumstances. The plans include a 25,000-square-foot Compassion Center, homes for 16 single mothers and their children, and a Family Life Center.

The projected five-year impact is 12 million meals provided, nearly 25,000 individuals impacted and nearly 450 single moms and children served.

Growing in Gainesville

The opening of our first Single Moms home in Gainesville is something to celebrate! In 2020, we took a major step forward to help more single moms and children heal and become self-sufficient.

We are actively raising money to purchase and open a second home. Each villa provides two single mothers and their children, safe, furnished spaces to live while they work diligently with our staff and mentors to make the changes needed to reach their full potential.

Jacksonville Campus Expansion

Single moms, children and struggling families will be served greatly at our new 25,000-square-foot Compassion Center, our Foster Family Homes and our new Single Moms paired villas - all of which are part of our Jacksonville expansion plan.

Over the course of five years, we will serve more than 30,000 children and families in need in Jacksonville and provide up to 12 million meals.

Azinger Family Compassion Center to Open This Year in Bradenton Area

We cannot wait for the Azinger Family Compassion Center to open this summer! It will sit on a campus of Foster Family Homes and will immediately be abuzz with volunteers and staff meeting the needs of children and families head-on. Within the first five years, we plan to provide more than 4 million meals to hungry children and meet the needs of more than 12,000 children and individuals thanks to this expansion.







Services Expanding Greatly in Sarasota

In 2020, we celebrated the groundbreaking of our Sarasota campus, which will include villas for single moms and their children, Foster Family Homes and the Vern and Sandy Buchanan Children's Center.




