A path to self-sufficiency

Single moms, age 18 and older, work to set goals with the guidance of dedicated and supportive staff, while living in a comfortable residential setting with her children for approximately 12 months. Through our program, we:

- Provide housing in safe, secure locations
- Enlist Godly women to serve as mentors
- Provide assistance to moms as they continue or complete their education
- Help them develop budgets and require them to save money that will allow them to graduate the program with more stability
- Teach moms how to cook nutritious meals that are simple and cost effective
- Connect them with local churches
- Teach them essential life skills that will help them be the best mom possible
